WAKE AT THE LAKE FOR JAKE

Some 7,827 mourners filed into Carrickeruppen Club last Friday night to pay respect to Big Jake "Rough Diamond" Reghan, the famous Australian Diamond miner whose last wishes were to be buried in Camlough.

Jake's request to be waked in Camloch arose because he suspected he had a "love child" born after an encounter with a local lassie near Camlough Foresters many years ago.

The raw emotion, sadness and grief of the wretched mourners was given light relief by a wake of outstanding entertainment in the old style.

Performances included musicians, Paddy Burns, Clare O'Callaghan, Ellen Matthews and Briege Rice. Neill Cromie did a traditional Brush Dance to honour the Aussie who had won the hearts of so many people in Camlough, whilst a tribute from Newry came in the guise of the Nolan Irish Dancers.

Jake's old friend and renowned piper P J Boyle piped his remains into the club, accompanied by Elvis, Banjo Bannon, Fr Jack and other luminaries.

In all seriousness, it was a well-planned, thought-out night of great entertainment in which traditional music clearly is deeply enjoyed and appreciated. Des Murphy, Pat McGinn and many more behind the scenes are to be congratulated for a very innovative night's entertainment. So far, 7,804 people have emerged from the wake, giving rise to fears of a protracted Lough-Inn. Senator George Mitchell, Colin Powell and other international negotiators have been briefed and are thought to be on standby to intercede this weekend.
